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BANFF RECEIVES ROYAL VISITORS ON HOLIDAY TRIP

Governor-General and Party Are Now at the Mountain Resort

EN ROUTE TO THE COAST: WILL RETURN LATER

Internment Camp Has Again Been Moved to Castle Mountain

BANFF, July 3.—Banff is again to be honored with a visit from the royal family Connaught. Their hoyal highnesses arrived on Sunday morning. Two wings of the C.P.R. hotel have been reserved and are redecorated for the royal party and suite. The duke will remain in Banff a few days before proceeding to the coast, returning in time for the great Indian review which is to take place on the 14th and 15th of July. Permission has been asked of Ottawa to make the duke a chief of the Stoney tribe.

The cofor and atmosphere of the Rockies has been carefully considered in the special decorations of the private suites prepared for the royal party at the Banff Springs hotel. The walls of the rooms are hung with native mountain flowers, pressed and framed, and the colors are the same soft colors seen from the windows which look down the Bow river valley to the Inrismaldi range or across to Cascade on one side and Sulphur mountain on the other.

All In Keeping

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The sitting room of H.R.H. the duchess is done in soft green and rose. The carpet is the rich green of pines; the walls the paler green of aspens and cottonwood, and the furniture is covered with shadow chintz in rose and green. The bedroom is in green and old gold and opens on a sleeping porch done in green, with a prizzly bearskin over the couch. The flowers on the walls are golden rod, Indian paint brush, corn flowers, arnica in different shades of purple and yellow, wild speirea, Hudson Bay lilies, tansy, and everlasting.

The carpet and walls of H.R.H. the duke's rooms are a woody brown and the furniture is done in a shadow chintz of blue and brown. The bedroom walls are hung with pansies, and in the sitting room are wild lupin, tiger lillies, wild columbine, browneyed Susans, arnica and speirea.

Princess Pat's Suite

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H.R.H. the Princess Patricia will have the suite on the third floor overlooking the Bow river valley on one side and the falls and Cascade mountain on the other. The color scheme in her sitting room is mauve and brown, and in the bedroom, rose and brown. Her walls, too, are hung with the pressed mountain flowers. The furniture in the private dining room is of the Jacobean period and the coloring is brown. The walls are hung with old Dickens prints, and the service is green and gold Spode china. The stands and boxes for the palms are rustic.

Camp Moved Again

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The internment camp, which has been stationed at Banff since last October is returning again to Castle Mountain for the summer months. An advance party of guards in charge of Capt. Hay, left on Tuesday to make the necessary preparations. The remainder of the guards under Major Spence left the last of the week. The soldiers will be much missed in Banff, and it is hoped that they will return. The interned aliens numbering about 350, will be engaged on the auto road for the summer.
